OUR MISSION

Moms Against Poverty is a global 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization dedicated to reducing the incidence and effects of poverty among impoverished children around the world. We advance this mission through our core programs in Education, Health Care & Wellness, Hunger Relief & Basic Provisions, and Orphan Care, empowering children to reach their fullest potential.

Founded in 2008, Moms Against Poverty has positively impacted the lives of more than 10 million children and families across 18 countries and regions through sustained, community-centered programming. Since 2010, we have held a specific license authorization from the U.S. Department of the Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) to provide charitable financing in Iran. This designation uniquely positions Moms Against Poverty as a United States - based NGO, among a small number of organizations authorized to directly address the humanitarian needs of the Iranian people.

OUR PHILOSOPHY

We believe in empowering impoverished children while honoring their individuality and preserving their dignity and self-worth. Meaningful change and healing become possible when children are met with compassion and supported through thoughtful guidance, care, and opportunity.

By investing in individuals and strengthening communities, we foster sustainable impact and help break the cycle of generational poverty. We are guided by integrity, transparency, and accountability, and we take our responsibility as stewards of resources seriously, ensuring they are used ethically and effectively in the service of those we aim to support.

IRAN






In 2025, families across Iran navigated one of the most difficult economic climates in recent years. Currency devaluation, soaring costs of living, and limited employment opportunities pushed basic necessities, including food, clothing, health care, and education, further out of reach. For children, these pressures did not simply disrupt daily life; they threatened long-term opportunity and stability.

In the face of these challenges, Moms Against Poverty stood firmly alongside the communities we serve. Throughout the year, we impacted millions of children and their families through sustained, community-centered programs that addressed both immediate hardship and the root causes of poverty. From building and equipping schools to expanding access to health care, providing food, sustainable water, and essential provisions, and delivering comprehensive orphan care, our work was designed not only to reduce the effects of poverty but to restore possibility. Our reputable and trusted team on the ground in Iran, Nikgaman Jamshid Charity, acting as our executive arm, ensured that programs were implemented with integrity, cultural understanding, and direct community oversight. Their leadership allowed us to remain responsive, accountable, and closely connected to the realities that communities in need faced each day.

As a U.S.-based nonprofit operating under a specific OFAC license, we were uniquely authorized to carry out humanitarian efforts in Iran with full compliance and transparency. This authorization enabled us to deliver aid directly, responsibly, and consistently, even amid complex geopolitical realities.

With the continued support of our grantors, donors, and partners, we continue to align our humanitarian response with urgent, time-sensitive needs by delivering practical, compassionate support that protects vulnerable children and families. Through a clear program structure, careful monitoring, and verifiable outputs, our efforts reflect a deep-rooted commitment to wise stewardship, transparency, and measurable impact. Drawing on operational lessons refined over several years, we can respond efficiently and reliably, ensuring high-quality support reaches those who need it most.



EDUCATION

51,110 children were supported through new school construction initiatives.

7,880 students, youth, and women heads of household were supported through the equipping of vocational and industrial schools, as well as the establishment and operation of empowerment workshops.

4,380 children were provided with textbooks, uniforms, school supplies, additional learning tools, and dormitory accommodations.

HEALTH CARE & WELLNESS

1,284,000 individuals were supported through the construction of hospital wards, including general surgery, chemotherapy and radiation therapy, orthopedic, and cardiac care, along with the provision of life-saving hospital equipment (including transplantation support and NICU equipment) and critical infrastructure upgrades.

14 children received life-saving treatment for thalassemia.

287 individuals were assisted with wheelchairs and medical treatment support.



ORPHAN CARE



5 orphanages were operated, supporting 70+ residents ages 3-18+.

310 orphaned, abandoned, and neglected children were provided care and shelter across multiple orphanages, and transitional housing for girls aging out of orphanage care was equipped.

200 children were supported in specialized rehabilitation centers, ensuring access to critical care and essential resources.

HUNGER RELIEF & BASIC PROVISIONS

3,860,000 meals provided to children and families facing hunger and food insecurity.

13,750 individuals gained access to sustainable water, gas pipelines, warm clothing, housing support, and sanitary facilities.



Sarina Learns How to Live Again

Sarina is 14 years old and lives in a small village near Bam in Iran's Kerman Province, where resources are limited and specialized medical care is often out of reach. For most of her childhood, she lived with thalassemia, a chronic blood disorder that slowly drained her strength and prevented her from experiencing a normal childhood. While other children played freely and attended school regularly, Sarina's life revolved around fatigue, hospital visits, and uncertainty. School became a distant possibility rather than a daily routine.

Her father works as a daily laborer, never knowing whether he will earn enough to provide even basic necessities for his family. Her mother carries the constant weight of worry, and her younger brother quietly hopes for the days when Sarina feels strong enough to laugh and play. Every few weeks, Sarina required blood transfusions to survive. Even accessing this essential treatment was a struggle. There were times when the family could not afford transportation to the city hospital. When they managed to borrow enough money to make the trip, they were sometimes told there was no blood available and that they would have to wait. The waiting, filled with exhaustion and uncertainty, was often the hardest part.

Doctors eventually explained that a bone marrow transplant was the only long-term solution. For a family struggling to cover transportation costs, the procedure seemed impossible. At the height of their despair, Moms Against Poverty stepped forward and covered the full cost of Sarina's transplant and the medications required for her recovery. The surgery was performed, followed by months of careful monitoring, pain, and healing. The road was not easy, but it was no longer without hope.

Today, one year later, Sarina's life looks different. Color has returned to her face. She breathes more easily and has regained the strength to run and play with her brother outside their home. She is preparing to return to school and looks forward to the new year with anticipation rather than fear. Although her family still lives in the same humble village, Sarina is no longer defined by hospital waiting rooms and uncertainty. Because of timely compassion and sustained support, she has moved from surviving to truly living.

UNITED STATES





In 2025, food insecurity in the United States continued to rise as families navigated persistent inflation, housing instability, and the expiration of pandemic-era safety nets. Rising living costs, food inflation, shrinking federal support, and interruptions to food stamps and other hunger relief programs left thousands of low-income and immigrant families across California struggling to make ends meet. For millions of children, access to consistent, nutritious meals remained uncertain, not because of scarcity, but because of systemic gaps in affordability and access.

Against this backdrop, Moms Against Poverty strengthened communities through our Hunger Relief & Basic Provisions Program. Partnering with local schools, community centers, churches, and shelters, we distributed over a quarter of a million pounds of culturally relevant groceries and hygiene kits to families across the Bay Area and Orange County's most impacted neighborhoods.


The year also required a rapid emergency response. Early in 2025, we supported families in Southern California impacted by the Eaton and Palisades wildfires, ensuring displaced households in need had access to food and essential supplies during a period of acute crisis.

Beyond food access, we created moments of dignity and joy through our annual Holiday Helping Hand toy drive, providing toys and gift cards to underserved children across the Bay Area.

As economic pressures and climate-related emergencies continue to strain vulnerable households, our approach

combines immediate relief with long-term stability. By addressing both hunger and essential needs, we help safeguard health, preserve dignity, and support families working toward a secure future.

Looking ahead to 2026, we will expand this work by launching grocery store-style free food pantries in Burlingame and San Francisco. These community-based pantries will allow families to access fresh, nutritious food directly in their neighborhoods, reducing barriers, restoring choice, and strengthening local food security systems.





EDUCATION

3 workshops were led for Afghan refugee girls in Sacramento, providing **28** girls with access to STEM education.

HUNGER RELIEF

250,178 pounds of food were distributed to **10,807** low-income families across the Bay Area and Southern California.

54,035 individuals were reached through this program, including **32,421** children.



BASIC PROVISIONS

15,106 hygiene items, including toothbrushes, laundry detergent, and shampoo, were provided to **4,966** low-income families across the Bay Area and Southern California.

4,829 individuals were supported through this program, including **14,669** children.

HOLIDAY HELPING HAND

1,712 toys were wrapped by dedicated volunteers during the annual Holiday Helping Hand Toy Drive for children in the Bay Area who otherwise would not have received a gift.

85 gift cards were distributed to families to help them purchase gifts for their children.



A Brighter Tomorrow for Mateo in San Leandro

At nine years old, Mateo had already learned how to be “the helper.” Living with his father and older sister in a small apartment in San Leandro, he noticed when things became harder. When his father’s construction hours were reduced, the cupboards grew emptier, and dinners became simpler, sometimes just rice and leftover vegetables. Mateo missed the weekends when his father cooked big pots of stew, filling their home with warmth and laughter. Lately, the kitchen had grown quieter, and the worry in his father’s eyes was hard to ignore.

In 2025, Mateo’s story began to shift. Through Moms Against Poverty’s food distribution program in the Bay Area, families like Mateo’s received weekly food boxes filled with fresh produce, dairy, grains, and protein. When their first box arrived, Mateo carefully unpacked oranges, spinach, chicken, beans, bread, and eggs onto the kitchen counter. That evening, his father made his signature stew again. The familiar aroma returned to their apartment, and for the first time in months, the table felt full again.

For Mateo, the food boxes meant more than meals. They meant energy to focus in school, fewer worries during the day, and the comfort of seeing his father carry a little less of the burden. In December, another moment of joy arrived through the holiday toy drive. Mateo chose a bright blue soccer ball for himself and art supplies for his sister, and that evening, he ran outside to play with friends, laughter echoing across the park.

The support extended beyond Mateo’s family. Grateful for the help they received, his father began volunteering at monthly food distributions when his schedule allowed, helping other families just as theirs had been helped.

By the end of the year, Mateo’s home felt steadier. The kitchen was busy again, mornings began with breakfast, and evenings were filled with homework and conversation. Mateo no longer carried the weight of worry on his small shoulders. Instead, he carried a soccer ball and the dream of joining a team one day.





SENEGAL





Since 2015, Moms Against Poverty has maintained a consistent and growing presence in the West African nation of Senegal, built on trusted local relationships and long-term community partnerships. Our work is sustained, structured, and deeply rooted.

In 2025, we launched our first vocational training program and expanded our Médine preschool, all while continuing to support the eight schools and the maternity clinic we've built, ensuring children have access to quality education, and families receive essential maternal and health services. These institutions serve as anchors within their communities, providing stability amid economic pressures, youth unemployment, and climate-related challenges that affect daily life.

Our dedicated team, on the ground, works closely with community leaders and stakeholders, maintaining strong, accountable relationships that enable programs to evolve alongside local needs. By investing in education, maternal health, and community infrastructure, we are strengthening generational opportunity and supporting Senegal's long-term development.



EDUCATION

3 brand-new classrooms, a teacher's office, a kitchen, and a multipurpose room were completed at the Médiine Extension Preschool, now serving more than 200 students.

20 young women were welcomed into Sewing for the Future, a licensed vocational training program equipping them with practical skills for economic independence.

2 new classrooms were completed at Fandane Elementary School.

8 elementary schools and preschools have been built by Moms Against Poverty across Senegal since 2015, providing quality education, clean sanitation facilities, and a brighter future for more than **3,500** children every year.



HEALTH CARE & WELLNESS

1,760 medical visits were coordinated at our rural maternity clinic in Sessene.

117 healthy children were born at the clinic.

3,222 vaccines were administered.

1,650 medications were distributed free of charge to families in Zone Sonatel.



HUNGER RELIEF & BASIC PROVISION

135,000+ meals were provided to **900** children, ages 3 to 6, attending our preschools, ensuring consistent nourishment during their most critical years of development.





ORPHAN CARE

30 abandoned or previously abused children received year-round care, transforming young lives and setting them on a path toward health, stability, and long-term success.

LOOKING AHEAD

9 classrooms are planned for a new elementary school and preschool to serve in the neighborhood of Saly Joseph, expanding access to education and long-term opportunities for families rebuilding their lives.



At dawn in the small village of Fandane, Awa used to wake her children to the sound of roosters and hunger. Her youngest, Mariama, cried softly as Awa tied a headwrap around her head, wondering how to stretch yesterday's rice into one more day. School felt like a distant dream. Books cost money, and empty stomachs do not listen to lessons.

Then Moms Against Poverty arrived.

The first change was the school building, rising from the red earth like a promise. Brick by brick, it became a place where children gathered not to work the fields, but to learn their letters. Each morning, when the doors opened, Awa walked Mariama there hand in hand. Mariama's eyes widened at the chalkboard, the bright posters, the sound of laughter. For the first time, Awa saw her daughter sit at a desk instead of on the ground. Something loosened in her chest, hope, unexpected and fragile.

Next came the meals. Every day at school, a warm bowl awaited her. Rice, vegetables, and sometimes fish. Mariama would come home with a fuller face and stories about sharing spoons with friends. Awa noticed the change quickly. There were fewer tears and more energy, a child who could run and sing instead of collapsing from hunger. Feeding a child, Awa realized, fed the whole family. When Mariama ate, Awa could finally breathe.

The health programs that followed were quiet but powerful. Nurses visited the village, weighing babies, teaching mothers how to prevent illness, and offering checkups that once required hours of travel. When Awa fell ill during one rainy season, she received care early. She recovered. She stayed strong for her children.

As the months passed, the village began to change. Parents spoke about lessons and harvests in the same breath. Children counted aloud as they walked home. Awa started helping in the school kitchen, stirring pots beside other mothers, their laughter rising with the steam.

Moms Against Poverty did not just build classrooms or deliver food. We built steadiness. We restored dignity. We reminded Awa and families like hers that poverty is not a destiny.

Now, when the sun rises, Awa still hears the roosters. But she also hears Mariama reciting the alphabet, confident and clear. In that sound, Awa hears a future she once believed was impossible.

PHILIPPINES



In 2025, Moms Against Poverty continued its partnership with Angel House Orphanage, ensuring that orphaned and vulnerable children received the love, care, and protection they deserve.

Many of these children have experienced rejection early in life and endured traumatic circumstances that affected their emotional and cognitive development. Through the care of a dedicated team of trained professionals, children are welcomed into a safe and nurturing environment where they are met with unconditional love and understanding. Here, they are encouraged to express their anger, anxiety, and feelings of rejection without fear.

Over time, remarkable transformations take place. As children work through their emotional challenges, their individual personalities begin to emerge, much like a

butterfly breaking free from its chrysalis. They rediscover how to smile, laugh, play, and form relationships with other children, their eyes once again filled with curiosity and hope for the future.

With access to nutritious meals, quality health care, and consistent education, children begin to thrive. They develop new skills through structured activities, educational games, and enriching experiences such as visits to the beach and community outings, supporting both emotional healing and healthy development.

Our work is ongoing. For every child who is reunited with their family or adopted into a new home, another child arrives at Angel House, often confused and frightened, an innocent victim of circumstances beyond their control. Each new arrival is met with a loving embrace as the journey to healing begins once again.

22 children received full-time care.

5 children were reunited with their families, **1** child was adopted, and **6** new children were admitted.

24,000 nutritious meals were served.

16,000 snacks were provided.

7 children attended elementary school, and **5** children were enrolled in daycare.

3 children were admitted to the hospital, while all children received regular health and dental checkups, along with required immunizations.

Los Angeles Wildfire Relief: Emergency food and essential supplies supported families displaced by the devastating Los Angeles wildfires.



Thalassemia Relief Campaign: Supporting children in Iran living with thalassemia through life-saving treatment and ongoing medical care.

Giving Path is Moms Against Poverty's monthly donor community, providing steady, compassionate support to vulnerable children and families around the world.

CRAFT HER FUTURE

In some of the most underserved communities, women wake each day with courage but without a sustainable path to independence. Craft Her Future exists to change that.

Through this program, Moms Against Poverty supports women facing extreme poverty, abandonment, and violence, including single mothers and survivors of child marriage and domestic abuse, by providing a pathway toward stability and self-reliance.

Participants receive comprehensive vocational training through hands-on instruction, professional mentorship, and access to essential materials and equipment. Beyond craftsmanship, women are trained in quality control, production, and income generation, equipping them with the skills to build sustainable livelihoods.

After completing the program, participants create handmade products that provide a reliable income, enabling them to support their families and restore household stability.

Inside the workshop, something powerful happens. Confidence returns, community forms, and hope takes root.

Each stitch reflects resilience.
Each product represents courage.
Each sale helps build a future defined not by survival, but by possibility.

Through reliable access to nutritious groceries, fresh produce, and essential staples, our pantry restores stability at home so children can focus on learning, growing, and dreaming beyond hunger. More than food distribution, it is a promise: no family in the Bay Area should have to choose between feeding their children and paying their bills.
